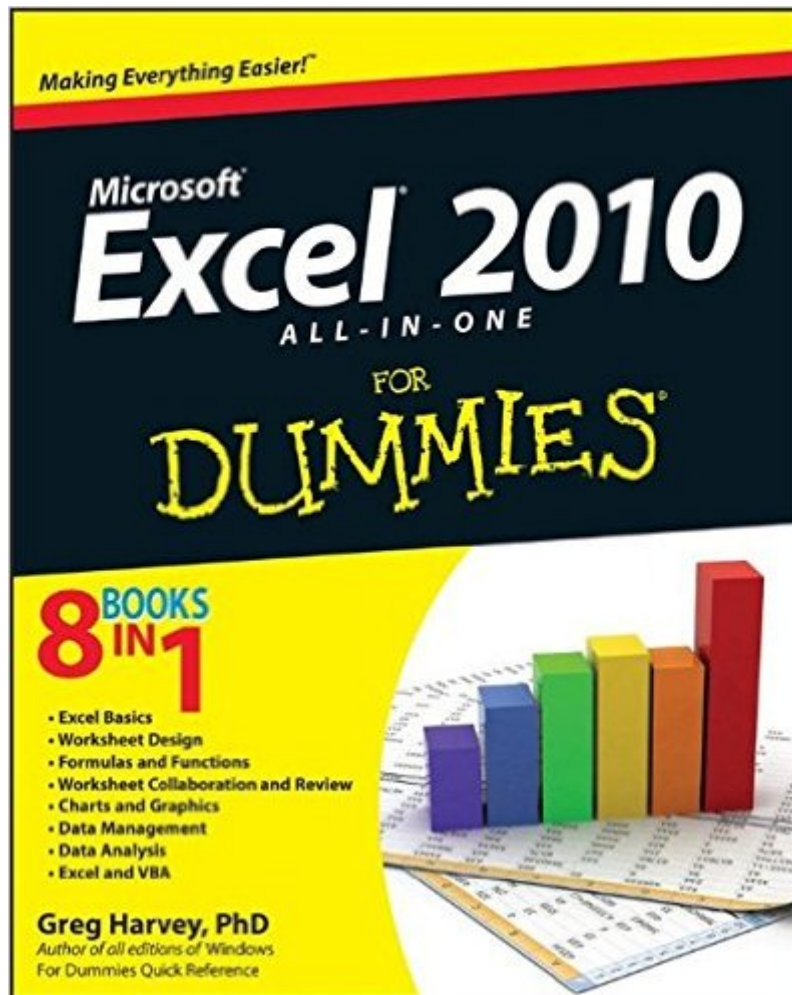

I got the Kindle addition thinking I could use my laptop, while using Excel on my desktop. You can not make out the charts, diagrams, illustrations in the E-Book. This is not very helpful, when you are teaching yourself Excel. The hard copy would be better.

Pros: comprehensive book, and for sure it has tons of info you would ever need. Cons: 1: quite hard to read and you have to be really concentrated. 2: it mentions a lot of buttons' names throughout the book, but the name of a button is only differentiated from the rest of the text by giving it an uppercase letter, that is it. As a result, you have to be super super concentrated, and so it slows you down.(why not give it a box, an underline, or a tiny real-time snapshot). 3. There are even some errors for button names (I cannot believe it! Maybe the author's Excel 2010 is not the same as mine???). For example, this book says "click the Funciton Wizard button on the Formula bar...", but heck, my Excel 2010 shows "Insert Function", So go figure how that feels for a rookie. 4. There should be more exampels to illustrate how to use the programs, but this book reads very boring like a gigantic instruction manual.I am new to learn Excel 2010, but know other job related softwares; and I think this book is not a great book for those who have no basic computer know-how.

This book is great in that I've used for solutions and answers when in the process of using Excel. It has adequately shown me how to use Excel more effectively that I was able to before. I was going to take a course (for ~\$100), but this is a better solution because it only gives me what I need at the time and not what I don't need!

I was looking for an easy to follow book that could help me brush up on the basics of excel and also teach me some more advanced things. This book seems to have been designed for people who are already proficient in Excel. It is very complicated and if you have no experience using excel, this book will do you no good. A very misleading title for sure.

I've used excel for 10 years or so, and what I've learned about it has been just what I needed to learn in order to perform data analysis as a portion of my job. Using this book as a self-teaching tool has given me a much firmer foundation in the program. I've also found it helpful as a resource on my desk to turn to in order to perform specific functions. (In fact, so have others in my office) Pleased with the purchase on both a personal and professional level.

I actually thought my Excel skill level was intermediate. However,compared to my co-workers, I feel like a beginner. So I purchasedthis book to add to the skills I already have, since many employersuse this software and are looking for advanced users. And you cannever go wrong with these "Dummies" publications. I also have onefor Quickbooks, that I refer to at work. It is well worth

the small investment.

This book does not include very much information on graphing; that is, it does not include much at all on making graphs. If you need graphing, look elsewhere. The 20 word minimum is a pain.

This certainly is what it claims to be. The problem is that I don't have the time to sit down and read it cover to cover and get frustrated trying to find what I'm trying to do on excel in the book so I've just been googling the particular task I need and it seems to be working just as well. In other words, if you have the time to sit down and read it's probably a great book, but for me right now as I'm trying to learn excel on a very limited schedule, the internet is working just as well.
